

I soloed in 1981 in Taylorcraft 85898 in San Carlos, Ca. I still have the remnants of the T-shirt I was wearing, which my instructor cut off to prove it. Shortly after that I began hearing about something called Oshkosh. I vaguely figured out that it had something to do with an airshow, and it was somewhere around Wisconsin. Isn't there cheese in Wisconsin?

So, 35 years later I finally made it to the airshow to end all airshows. And wow, what an airshow. I had no idea what to expect, and whether or not it would measure up to all the hype.

I can tell you that like a great movie, it delivered, and exceeded any expectations I might of had. I wasn't able to witness the arrival ballet that I have heard so much about, but the organization of the event was fantastic. Volunteers were everywhere in case you needed to ask a question. The final statistics are in: over 10,000 airplanes flown in, 583,000 people in attendance, and over 1,000 educational forms offered. Wow. And NO noise abatement. Anywhere. EAA CHAPTER 1268 MINUTES

The August 9 Board of Directors' meeting was called to order at 6:15 Vice President Don Booker, with Paul Seibert, Jeanette Woods, Bill Wheadon and Darrel Jones present.

The Chapter paid \$435.20 to Trevor Meeks for web hosting charges to date. Air Explorer parent Gretchen McDougall has volunteered to help build a new website and get it up to date.

President Robin Tatman has the paperwork to start a non-profit 501.c.3 LLC flying club to provide low cost flight instruction for Air Explorers or other Young Eagles to start lessons toward obtaining a private pilot's license.

Board member Darrel Jones stressed the need for ongoing publicity for the Chapter and airport. He will ask for volunteers to write articles for the local newspapers to raise public awareness of the benefits of local aviation.

Young Eagles flew 14 kids with Bill Wheaton, Walt Eastman, Tim Bloodgood and Ron Price as pilots and John Thomason, Rhonda Giaccio and Paul Seibert working on registration and as ground crew.

The September meeting will be a week earlier on September 6 and will be held at Jack Caldwell's winery in Napa. Directions will be emailed to the members. Jack is hosting the dinner and wine.

The Board meeting was adjourned at 6:50 pm.

Dinner was Papa Murphy's pizza furnished by Darrel Jones, with ice cream and cookies by Ron Price.

Marc Ashton announced a private pilot test prep class in Petaluma from August 25 through November 17 from 7 to 9:30 at the Petaluma Pilot Training Center at the Petaluma SRJC campus. Cost will be \$175, including the textbook.

The officers gave their reports to the members.

The meeting was adjourned and Rafe Thomset gave a slideshow presentation of Oshkosh 2016, with photos of Brodhead and the Pietenpol fly-in included.

There were no meeting minutes for the September meeting since it was a social evening at Jack Caldwell's winery in Napa.

What is the best weather for a takeoff on the Reflecting Pool? Great question. A headwind is helpful for maximum lift, and calm water is necessary for a smooth takeoff. It also really helps if the weather cooperates as occurred back in 1923. We don't recommend trying it now.

A century ago, Washington was targeted by aviators and stunt pilots at the dawn of the golden age of aviation. The Reflecting Pool takeoff was one of the more interesting stunts performed in 1923. Given the waves in the photo, it appears there was indeed a good headwind to help with lift. After the floatplane rose above the Reflecting Pool, the pilot maneuvered the airplane around the Lincoln Memorial. The stunt was successful.
