#### **YOUNG EAGLES**

This was a moderately busy Young Eagles rally today. The weather was clear enough for the morning for us to fly, with ceilings scattered and broken at about 2,000 feet. Those were in addition to the ones we got from Sonoma Valley.

The minutes of the last meeting reflect the discussion about getting more human resources to help BK with the Young Eagles rallies. Two people for registration, two for ground and ramp crew, and two more for good measure in addition to the pilots would make the job much easier. We only had Roland and John T out this morning.

BK was at Young Eagles last month but was in a lot of pain with his bad back. He commented

that he wasn't sure how long he could continue as Young Eagles Liaison, but being a Marine (there are no ex-Marines), he intended to keep going until he drops. I'm not sure if he dropped, but wasn't able to make it out today.

## **EAA CHAPTER 1268 MINUTES**

EAA 1268 Board of Directors Meeting February 12, 2019

The Board Meeting was called to order by President Robin Tatman at 6:20 pm.

Present were: President Robin Tatman, Vice President Darrel Jones, Treasurer Bill Wheadon, Secretary Nelleke Cooper, Directors Jeanette Woods and Roland Gangloff, Young Eagles Coordinator BK White. Absent: Director, Paul Siebert

First order of business:

Darrel informed us of a new \$10,000 Youth Flight Training Scholarship program by the EAA.

Interview with Fabiola Chavez, her parents, Rosa and Angel and Mentor Sindi Mikkelsen for Air Academy Scholarship.

Darrel explained the steps to be taken for the application and other pertinent information.

- 1. Apply to EAA National, and she will receive a free student EAA membership and online Sport Aviation Magazine.
- 2. Session from July 26-August 3
- 3. Air Fare to Oshkosh provided by the profits from Ron Price's Hamburger fund

4. EAA fills in with the rest of the scholarship and we have points from the number of Young Eagle flights conducted during the year.

Board Meeting adjourned at 6:55 pm

General Meeting called to order by President Robin Tatman at 8:30 pm

Robin gave a big Thank you to Bill and Jan Wheadon for a delicious dinner of Chili, salad, cornbread, dessert and ice cream.

Wayne Schake introduced his guest Gary Edwards, Frank Russo introduced Ron Hill, and Richard Craig introduced his guest Roger Anderson.

BK White gave a Young Eagles report for Sunday, February 10. The weather was clear and 14 youngsters were flown. Pilots: Darrel Jones, Ron Price, Tim Bloodgood, Don Booker, Frank Russo and Robin Tatman. Robin discussed finding a helper/assistant for Young Eagles Coordinator BK White. Young Eagles events have been conducted without the sufficient number of volunteers and additional help is needed. Minimum of 6 volunteers are needed at Young Eagles days: 2 at Registration,2 at the Flight Line for safety plus 2 additional helpers.

Darrel and Robin will be conducting an outreach campaign to get more support for Skypark activities and will advocate at the Shareholders meeting to recruit a 6 Member Committee willing to help, such as organizing Fly-Outs and make airplane seats available. Roland suggested getting a contact list.

A survey conducted 6 years ago indicated that for the Membership the social aspect of Skypark is most important. Darrel added that youth aviation outreach was the Chapter's main focus.

Integration and the coordination of flight scholarships and Fly-Out dates will be posted

on our website by our website manager, Gretchen McDougall.

Report regarding our interview with Fabiola, our Air Academy applicant to membership. Fabiola is a senior in High School. Her GPA is an admirable 4.6. She is very personable, applied to 4 UC Universities and had an interview at Stanford for a scholarship. Her future aspiration is to be a Chemical Engineer.

Our speaker, Yayoi West was introduced by Darrel Jones. Yayoi is an accomplished pilot. She has many diverse interests and has been designated as a Solar System Ambassador by NASA.

The Solar System Ambassadors program is a public engagement effort that works with motivated volunteers across the nation to communicate the science and excitement of NASA's space exploration missions and discoveries to the people in their communities.

Yayoi gave a detailed and fascinating lecture with informative illustrations about the Parker Solar Probe, a NASA robotic spacecraft, which went to space in 2018 and will fly closer to the sun than ever before. It will provide new data on solar activity and make critical contributions to our ability to forecast major space-weather events that impact life on Earth.

The concept of the Mission was conceived 60 years ago by Eugene Parker, a distinguished Astrophysicist at the University of Chicago. Parker proposed how stars—including our Sun—give off energy. This is the first NASA mission that has been named for a living individual.

The Parker Solar Probe was launched by the Delta 4 heavy rocket. Its speed will reach 430,000 mph. and it is currently en route to probe the outer corona of the Sun. The Parker Probe will use assists from Venus the brake its orbit in order to get closer and closer to the Sun eventually to within 4 million miles.

Its Special Thermal Protection System Assembly is made to withstand outside temperatures of 2500 degrees F. Yayoi explained how the 3<sup>rd</sup> stage boost into its final orbit the Parker Solar Probe will have its own trajectory systems control and therefore it is really **Rocket Science!**

#### PETALUMA AIRPORT NEWS

This is a little long for our newsletter, but I'm reprinting it because I feel it applies to all aviators in all their local communities.

Greetings Fellow Wing Nuts/Aviators (but I repeat myself....J)

In case you haven't heard, there was an incident recently of what has been deemed: "Low flying aircraft joyriding over Petaluma City limits." Thanks for our ever vigilant Secretary Nancy Sasser, we picked up this cue being posted on a local neighborhood site. The incident has apparently been reported to the FAA and local police. This is the posting:

Reckless flying in west Petaluma
Anyone witnessing low flying airplanes joy riding over Petaluma city limits should contact William.bell@faa.gov. This is a potential tragedy that the FAA is aware of and corrected last year but a few bad actors have evidently been biding their time and are back.

40 neighborhoods in Crime & Safety

Needless to say, we must always be mindful of safety when flying and the impact we may have on the public below and around us. Nancy has reached out to this individual to discuss this incident/observation. The report states that one white and one yellow aircraft were seen flying low over a populated area in the west of town.

As we all know, 1000 ft is the minimum altitude for flight over areas with people, housing etc and while lower flight is allowed over unpopulated areas, so long as if an engine failure were to occur that a safe 'landing' could be executed without impact on people, structures etc, it is usually not advisable nor wise to fly that low.

While non-aviators can often misjudge the altitude of an aircraft in flight assessing the altitude to be lower than is actually the case, we must always be mindful that even if such an incorrect estimate of altitude is made, the potential negative repercussions can be severe.

Petaluma Municipal is a significant positive resource for our community and we have all worked hard to protect it and its viability for the future. We must always guard against anything that could be seen as a negative impact in this regard.

So, as has happened on occasion and is encouraged by AOPA, if you witness someone, be they a PAPA member or not, operating their aircraft in a manner that is incompatible with FAA regulations or in keeping with good 'community relations' we encourage you to speak to the individual; not as an indictment of their flying but as an encouragement to help us support and maintain the good community relationship we have all worked so hard to cultivate and maintain for over 40 years.

As an interesting point of coincidence, I personally received a call from a friend in late January who was walking in Shollenberger Park and reported that a low flying aircraft flew quite low near the park and then disappeared 'behind' a building flying southeast. I explained the rules governing flight over uninhabited land and that put the matter to rest. But, one can see who such an observation can become misconstrued and result in a call to the authorities.

So, let's all remember to always fly safely for ourselves, our passengers and those 'civilians' on the ground. We owe a huge debt to those who have come before us in keeping O69 vibrant and growing. Let's not let anyone jeopardize this wonderful resource and our freedom to participate in our passion for flight. So let's all keep up the good work and we'll have a continued bright and happy future on our very own slice of "airport heaven" in O69.


