VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Vice President's report is a collection of bits and pieces from Sonoma Skypark and EAA Chapter 1268.

The first big news is that we have the kitchen remodel completed, and done within budget. We still have need and wants though.

We bought a new stove for \$833. It wasn't in our original budget, so we're asking for donations to cover the cost. We've received \$250 so far, so we only have \$583 to go.

Marilyn is grateful for the beautiful new kitchen. Tony MacKinnon is donating a new microwave. Marilyn said that it would be nice to have a toaster oven as well for Saturday hamburgers. You don't need to wait until Christmas to help with that.

We used much of the \$5,000 donated so far for the kitchen/restroom remodel. Instead of donating \$1,000,000 to the opera or the local butterfly society, consider making a donation (tax deductible) to the restroom fund. We are still looking for about \$30,000 for materials to renovate the restrooms. If you've been in there, you have felt the floor sag under you as you walked in. With funding, we could have a new restroom, ADA complaint, within about three months. Wouldn't that be nice. We would even dedicate it to you. You can give the remaining \$970,00 to the butterflies.

Michael Wray, our Chapter 1268 airplane build team leader, has said that the old shop vacuum is more than anemic. A nice, big 12-gallon Craftsman shop vac for the build project would be a dandy addition to the project.



Speaking of the Pietenpol project, we have a cadre of young people at the clubhouse every Saturday morning at 9 am to work on building

a real, live airplane. Come out early for Saturday hamburgers and peek in to take a look at the progress.



We could use an organized, possibly OCD, person to organize and inventory the tools donated to the Chapter for the shop and build project. Jim Clark gave some great sheet metal tools and lots of aircraft hardware, and I brought in some hand and power tools from my late brother-in-law's estate. If you have an unused rolling tool cabinet, it would be put to good use for all the sockets, wrenches and hand tools currently in boxes.

We would like to put together a Chapter Tool Crib so Chapter members could borrow tools for their projects. EAA has software available to organize that. We only need a volunteer to put that together.

Another Pietenpol builder from Santa Rosa, Jim Boyer, donated more Pietenpol parts and hardware to the project, along with a big stack of books. We just need a couple people to put all that in order as well.

Ernie Ganas is donating a late model desktop computer to go with our donated flight simulator. Rony Kumiawan will get it set up and running. The Chapter is looking for a newer copy of Microsoft Flight Simulator so our Young Eagles can get some simulator practice in the clubhouse.

EAA 1268 MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN AND TREASURER REPORT April 2023

Expenses for April totaled \$6,141.80 and income was \$6,995.

In April four checks were cashed – three of them pertained to our sponsorship of attendees at the 2023 Air Academy. One of those three checks was to cover the balance of tuition due for the four attendees (\$1000), and two were to cover air fare tickets for two of the attendees (\$1841.80). The fourth check (\$3300) was for the flight training account for one of our Ray Scholars at The Petaluma Pilot Training Center.

We did receive two deposits from EAA for one of our other Ray Scholars – both for \$3300 (\$6600 total). One bank deposit was made totaling \$395 - \$120 for dues, \$250 to our kitchen remodel fund and \$25 in proceeds from our April dinner.

Total chapter funds are \$43,314.16 distributed in the following accounts: Checking account - \$30,337.05 Savings account - \$7,645.79 CD account - \$5,331.32 Total account funds \$43,314.16

EAA CHAPTER 1268 MINUTES

April 11, 2023

EAA 1268 Board of Directors Meeting

The Board Meeting was called to order by President Don Booker at 6:15 pm.

Present: President Don Booker, Vice President Darrel Jones, Treasurer Bill Wheadon, Directors, Roland Gangloff, Nelleke Cooper, Marsi Allard and special guest Marilyn Siebert. Absent: Secretary Yayoi West

Bill Wheadon's treasury report can be found in the March Newsletter and he reported that our CD is rolling over and the interest rate will increase from 1.39% to .4.07%. Scholarship discussion. Darrel has been in contact with Scott at the EAA and we have acceptance for 4 campers for the Air Academy. Last year airfare tickets were as much as \$1,500 each. This year we have been able to obtain 2 airfares for under \$1,000. There are a few issues to be resolved as some campers may need companion travelers due to either leaving 1 day before or 1 day after to spend at AirVenture or being too young to travel unaccompanied.

Darrel Jones filed the statement of information with the California Secretary of State and Bill Wheadon filed the annual federal tax return. There was some confusion about filing the State of California annual tax return. Darrel will investigate the requirements. These are yearly requirements and had lapsed years ago by previous Boards not filing the required returns. Chapter 1268's non-profit status was successfully reinstated by Darrel and Bill.

Discussion on the kitchen renewal. Marilyn Siebert was present to bring up some suggestions on the kitchen design as she has been spending lots of time working in the kitchen during Saturday hamburgers. In addition, by virtue of not having a person in the office, Marilyn has been getting all the supplies. Darrel asked Marilyn to ask members attending the Saturday barbecue for volunteers to find a crew to remove all the old cabinets and take them to the dumps, to which she agreed. Darrel was able to purchase a large commercial stainless-steel sink. Rather than closed cabinets, open shelving, large prep tables and a stove/cooktop with oven are needed.

Bill made a motion to approve expenditures of funds up to \$3,500 for the kitchen remodel. Second by Roland Gangloff. Motion unanimously approved. This amount does not include funds for the stove, which will need a special request fundraiser.

Board Meeting adjourned 6:55 pm.

Membership meeting called to order by Don Booker at 7:40 pm

A delicious dinner of Carnitas and the trimmings was provided by Ligia and Don Booker, Wayne and Celia Schake.

Guests: Grace Warden, who's interest was sparked by witnessing a presentation at her school in Santa Rosa on becoming a pilot by UAL Captain Kirstin Cooper, who started her flying career at Sonoma Skypark. Grace was accompanied by her father.

Don requested a volunteer to be the meal coordinator and Sindy Mikkelsen accepted as long as a roster with names and contact information would be provided. It was also suggested we could have co-hosts. Marsi Allard volunteered to be the cook for the May meeting.

Young Eagles Day was delayed till next Sunday 4/16 due to Easter.

Don Booker gave a report on the kitchen and asked for donations towards the stove/oven for the new kitchen. Bill Wheadon, Roland Gangloff and Nelleke Cooper each made a donation.

Wonderful presentation by Steve Brosseau.

Steve has over 5000 hours "Flying Without and Engine."

He started flying gliders when he was 16 years old and (one of the first ones he flew was a 1-26A.)

Not only did Steve fly all over the world, including Namibia, New Zeeland, Australia, the Mohave Desert he also flew many different gliders and showed us pictures of some incredible sceneries.

The furthest distance record is +3000 km. set in 2003 on a mountain in South America by Klaus Ohlmann and the longest flight in the air is an amazing 70 hours. The highest record was set in 2018 at 76,000 ft.

Many technical and weather-related issues were presented and Steve answered many questions from the members.

I had to patch some of the plywood behind the old cabinets and run the power for the new stove before we could get the painting done.

Skypark Aviation Profile: Jeanette Woods By George Bachich



Born Evangeline
Jeanette Oclassen on
December 29, 1932 in
Manila, the Philippines,
Jeanette Woods grew up
speaking Tagalog,
Spanish, and English. Her
father was an executive
with the Philippines long
distance telephone

company. Her Spanish great aunt on her dad's side, a piano teacher, began teaching Jeanette to play piano at age four. Jeanette also started ballet lessons at five, and started tap dancing at ten.

On December 8, 1941, when Jeanette was just under nine years old, the Japanese invaded the Philippines. By the following April Japan had driven out U.S. forces and installed its own government. Jeanette remembers attending school under Japanese occupation

from 1941 to 1945 and being assigned to alter math textbooks used by younger children by blacking out references to the United States including dollar signs, which she replaced with peso symbols. Her father was recruited by other Americans in the resistance movement to help establish and maintain radio communications with the exiled American military forces from a mountain top outside Manila.

As conditions worsened in Manila, her uncle took Jeanette and her brother Frank to live in Tanay, where he could fish in the river to help feed them. Although they gave up their nice house in Manila for a bamboo floored thatched roof Nipa hut in Tanay, Jeanette recalls a fairly normal existence, including diving for pebbles in the crystal-clear water of the river about a block and a half down the hill from their hut.

Jeanette, her mother, and her four siblings finally fled the Philippines in 1945 on the USS General John Pope, a 622-foot U.S. Navy troop transport capable of accommodating over 5,000 service members. During the trip, some of the American troops had fun teaching Jeanette and the dozen or so other kids on board their favorite songs, apparently including some fairly risqué ones, as her mother, upon first hearing them, forbade Jeanette to ever sing them again.

The ship was initially headed for San Francisco, but after receiving word of the Japanese surrender on September 2, 1945, it changed course for Seattle in order to avoid the congestion and celebratory fireworks on San Francisco Bay. Representatives of the American Red Cross met their ship in Seattle and escorted the civilian passengers, who were wearing thin tropical clothing when they boarded the ship, to a department store where they were given clothes more appropriate for the Seattle winter. After three days in Seattle Jeanette and her family boarded a train for San Francisco, where her father joined them a few weeks later.

In San Francisco Jeanette was enrolled in the sixth grade even though she had been just a fifth grader in Manila. She went on to attend Mission High School, where she continued dancing, adding hula to her repertoire, which she and her friends performed for the high school student body. She graduated from Mission High School in 1951, married John Summerfield, went to work for Western Pacific Railroad as a secretary in the perishable freight department, and attended night classes at San Francisco City College (she was a very busy lady).

Her son John was born in 1954, followed by David in 1956. With some babysitting assistance from her great aunt and her grandmother, Jeanette continued working for the railroad and pursuing her education at San Francisco State University, where she graduated in 1956 with a major in mathematics. Her love of math led her eventually to a PhD in Education from Stanford in 1975, in further preparation for her career as a math professor.

During her graduate studies Jeanette taught prospective elementary school teachers at San Francisco State how to teach the New Math to their students, and authored a book on how to teach New Math to elementary school teachers. She also taught math and some elementary computer science at San Francisco City College. She became a math professor at San Francisco State, College of Marin, and Indian Valley College, eventually retiring in 1993.

Jeanette remembers two summer road trips she and John took with their young boys in their Morris Minor to visit John's family in Ohio and Jeanette's uncle in Buffalo, New York. Three days each way with four people and baggage in such a tiny car helped make those trips forever memorable.

Jeanette ended her marriage to John in 1966 and continued raising her boys, both of whom attended a swim school in San Carlos and became competitive divers. She took them to many diving meets from which they brought home lots of trophies. Jeanette always dreamed of learning to fly, but the demands of being a single mom caused her to postpone flying until her boys were grown.

She married Harold "Hal" Woods in 1980. Hal had been a waist gunner on a B-17 in World War II, had bailed out over Germany late in the war, was subsequently captured and spent the next nine months as a P.O.W. By the time Jeanette met him, Hal was an avid golfer, so Jeanette took up golf, too. Upon her retirement from teaching they moved to Novato, joined the Marin Country Club, and took many golfing trips together, first by car, and later in their Cessna 172.

Jeanette and Hal were a great team and Hal was Jeanette's greatest supporter. Hal wanted Jeanette to realize her dream of learning to fly, so one day in 1996, soon after moving to Sonoma, as they were driving down Eighth Street East Hal noticed a windsock and turned in to investigate. Hal left Jeanette in the car while he went to find someone, who turned out to be John Carmichael. Jeanette could see them talking and watched Hal walk around a Cessna 150, kicking the tires. When he returned, he said the airplane seemed okay, so he had negotiated her an introductory ride.

At the age of 63 Jeanette took off with John Carmichael and flew an airplane for the first time. She liked it so much that she

immediately signed up for flying lessons. She soloed in the Cessna 150 and within a few months got her private pilot license. She and Hal soon bought a 180 hp Cessna 172 in Colorado, which the two of them and John Carmichael flew back to Skypark. Jeanette, Hal, and John were also partners in a Piper Clipper which John and Hal flew back from Alaska, and in which Jeanette got her taildragger endorsement. Jeanette also eventually got her instrument rating in her Cessna 172.

Jeanette and Hal Woods and John and Kathy Carmichael quickly became good friends and enjoyed many travel adventures together, including in Alaska. On one of those trips Jeanette and Hal drove a pickup camper from Sonoma to Anchorage, camping all the way. A couple of other times they went by airline. In Anchorage, Jeanette got a taste of flying on floats in John and Kathy's float plane. They also traveled together in Hal and Jeanette's Cessna to Mulege, Mendocino, San Andreas, Lakeport, the Clearlake Splash-in, and other local destinations. Kathy was kind enough to share some of her travel memories and photos for this article. Jeanette also flew Hal and another couple to Oshkosh in their Cessna 172, and made yet another trip to Oshkosh after Hal's death.

Jeanette and Hal were valuable assets and key participants in Sonoma Skypark and EAA Chapter 1268 activities and events for decades. Hal's legal expertise proved immensely valuable, and Jeanette was deeply involved in EAA and Young Eagles. She is seen here on April 26, 2023 modeling the EAA jacket she received upon completing her 300th Young Eagles flight. Jeanette served on the Skypark Board of Directors and as Corporate Secretary, and was active in Skypark Family fun Days, where she put a lot of effort into the silent auction. She used her computer talents to produce brochures and flyers for various

events, and produced multi-media slide shows for Christmas parties.

She and Hal were active in hosting the EAA B17 and B24 visits to Napa and Santa Rosa Airports, Wings over Vineberg fundraisers for Sonoma Valley Hospital Foundation, and Schellville New Years parties.
