PRESIDENT'S REPORT



Greetings from...Vallejo!

I am very happy to have Dr. Ann Kottler as our guest speaker this Tuesday evening. She is back from the big AME meeting in Chicago where all the docs get the latest updates regarding our FAA medicals - new guidelines, changes in approved or disapproved drugs, and changes in your medical conditions that may be considered more restrictive for the class of medical applied for - or less.

Ann spoke to us way back in 2016. She has been an AME for many years, but she first

started as an Emergency Room physician, and then kind of as a fluke get a position as a temporary doc at United Airlines filling in. Temporary became full time. In her practice there, she became very familiar with many of the conditions that pilots can potentially lose their medicals and what your options are. She has brought that knowledge with her in to her private practice and is a powerful ally for you to talk to about anything you might be worried about before you fill out that MedExpress form.

She has invited me to refer any potential pilots (sometimes along with their parents) for a free consultation about their ability to pass an FAA Medical. She is always generous with her time and has been very helpful for several people who called her.

She may bring a few guests with her for you to get to know as well, so it should be a fun evening. Bring your questions!

We are always looking to make our Young Eagles program more fun, effective, and efficient. We have a tremendous team put together led by Gretchen McDougall and Darrel Jones complemented by a wonderful group of dedicated volunteer pilots. On the efficiency end, I am still waiting to get our online registration in place. The new and improved version is not quite ready for prime time yet, but hopefully will be available soon. I have 3 and possibly 4 donated iPads ready, but mostly we need the new system to be ready.

In case you haven't looked lately, the EAA has a 5 Step Young Eagles Flight Plan that has some great resources imbedded in it that we would like to make our Young Eagles participants AND their parents aware of.

Step 1: Take a flight! That's a no brainer. Step 2 and 3: EAA Student Membership -Either as a volunteer pilot, or a volunteer milling around at an event, help to make sure that each participant gets a logbook that is filled out to take home, and have the code on the back of the logbook explained. If they go to the EAA website, they can use the code to activate their membership which has a remarkable number of resources and freebies that will be good from age 8 - 18. They must go on the website though to register for it. We also give them a free student membership at our local 1268 which includes our newsletter to they can stay in touch with what events we have that they may be interested in. Again, they must register for that as well. Once we get the online registration in place, we will be able to automatically enroll them to start getting our newsletter.

So, what is some of the free stuff? Free EAA AeroEducate account (that's worth a newsletter in itself); FREE admission to 300+ science and technology museums, FREE one-year Academy of Model Aeronautics Student Membership, FREE Soaring Society of American Cadet Membership, FREE electronic copy of EAA Sport Aviation magazine, and wait....there's more! Just lots of good stuff.

Step 4: Sign up for the Sporty's Learn to Fly Course, which has been recently updated and improved with great new features, content, and best of all it is line with the FAA guidelines so there is not negative learning and wasted time.

Step 5: Take a flight lesson. And guess what, when our participants complete the first three modules of the Sporty's Course, they get a certificate from the EAA for a free flight.

Pretty straight forward program. We do a great job keeping it fun. What's not to love about donuts AND flying on a beautiful Sunday morning. But we can keep helping to steer the kids and their parents that have the bug after their flight(s) toward those great resources that the EAA has in place. I am hoping to have some extra volunteers with us that can help with that. More to follow.

I hadn't heard that at some schools they encourage kids to put pictures of the most fun things they did during their summer in their lunch box. I have been talking to the other officers about finding someone to staff an information table at our Young Eagles rallies to talk to the Young Eagles and their parents about joining and becoming active in EAA Chapter 1268.

Every Young Eagle qualifies for a free membership in the national organization, with access to the monthly Sport Aviation magazine online and Sporty's Learn to Fly course.

The Board approved free student memberships for youth under 19 years old, but we need someone at the Young Eagles event to engage with the families and inform them of the many resources Chapter 1268 offers.

Please let us know if your can help out with this very important campaign. The kids and parents are obviously enthusiastic about aviation and would greatly enhance our Chapter.

We will be discussing the restroom remodel at this Board meeting and will probably get it started so as not to run into the holiday season. We will be flying on a wing and a prayer hoping the contributions come in as funding is needed. We will be offering different levels of contribution, from platinum to bronze. The Pietenpol project got a big boost when Ron Price picked up a core Corvair engine and prop from the Kelch Aviation Museum at Brodhead, Wisconsin, and drove it home with Rafe Tomsett from the Pietenpol fly-in and Oshkosh. Ron was able to get the engine and prop for \$500, which gives the project a head start firewall forward.

The budget for the Piet project is \$17,000. The project has benefited from some very valuable donations, but still needs funding to complete. Chapter 1268 advanced \$5,000 against future fundraising, and I was able to raise almost \$2,000 selling donated parts at Brodhead and Airventure, but we still have a way to go.

CHAPTER PIET BUILDING PROJECT

The big news for the Pietenpol project is the arrival of a Corvair engine and propeller. They

came from the Museum at Brodhead, WI. and had been fitted to another aircraft (type unknown). The Museum wants to change out the Corvair for the engine that originally powered their plane and sold EAA Chapter 1268 the engine and prop for \$500.

A big thank you to Ron Price and Rafe Tomsett who transported the engine from Wisconsin in Ron's pickup, over 2000 miles.

The engine last flew about 25 years ago and will require inspection and overhaul. If you have any experience of Corvair engines we would love to hear from you.

The attached photo shows James Kurniawan checking out the ergonomics of the Pietenpol cockpit. Pietenpol crew should be slim and agile. Access to the front cockpit through the struts requires advanced gymnastics.

James has made a major contribution to the project, including CAD drawings and many hours of sawing, glueing, sanding and fitting. He starts college in Merced this month, but hopes to visit regularly, possibly ferried by Luis Membrilla, who is steadily building hours.

EAA 1268 FLIGHT ADVISOR



Over the next few months, I would like to discuss causal factors in aircraft accidents and have an open dialogue about how to identify and mitigate these factors. Our discussion will include general aviation where the majority of our time is spent, but also include commercial aviation where a large amount of data is available, and where much of the mitigation research occurs.

First, let's look at causal factors in airplane accidents. The graph below from the NTSB shows pilot error as the leading factor. Until remotely piloted aircraft become the norm, pilot error will always be the leading cause of aircraft accidents. Mitigation strategies lower the number of pilot related aircraft accidents and incidents.

One of the classic examples of pilot error, and a failure of multiple, controllable factors is the accident in Tenerife, Canary Islands, Spain on March 27, 1977. Please read the accident summary below to see how important mitigation strategies are, and the horrific consequences of non-compliance

Boeing 747-206B and Boeing 747-121 KLM Flight 4805, Pan American Flight 1736. Tenerife, Canary Islands, Spain March 27, 1977


Both aircraft - KLM Flight 4805, and Pan American (Pan Am) Flight 1736 had been diverted to Los Rodeos Airport on the Spanish island of Tenerife in the Canary Islands due to a bombing at the airport at their final destination, the neighboring island of Gran Canaria. Later, when flights to Gran Canaria resumed, the aircraft collided on the runway in Tenerife as the KLM Boeing 747 initiated a takeoff while the Pan Am aircraft was using the runway to taxi.

The Spanish investigative authority, Subsecretaria de Aviacion Civil, found that the fundamental cause of the accident was the KLM captain: 1. Took off without clearance; 2. Did not obey the "stand by for take-off" direction from the tower; 3. Did not interrupt take off on learning that the Pan Am aircraft was still on the runway; and 4. In reply to the KLM flight engineer's query as to whether the Pan Am aircraft had already left the runway, the KLM captain replied emphatically in the affirmative. The investigation also believed that the KLM captain's decision to take off may have been influenced by revised crew duty time limitations recently enacted by the Dutch

government. The restrictions were inflexible and highly penalizing to the captain, if exceeded. With a total of 583 fatalities, the crash remains the deadliest accident in aviation history. All 248 passengers and crew aboard the KLM flight were killed. There were also 335 fatalities and 61 survivors on the Pan Am flight.

The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) investigated the Tenerife airport disaster, which occurred on March 27, 1977, when two Boeing 747s collided on the runway at Los Rodeos Airport in Tenerife, Spain. The crash killed 583 people, making it the deadliest aviation accident in history.



The NTSB investigation found that the primary cause of the crash was the actions of the KLM captain, including:

• Taking off without clearance

- Disobeying the tower's "stand by for take-off" direction
- Not stopping the takeoff after learning that the Pan Am plane was still on the runway
- Telling the flight engineer that the Pan Am plane had left the runway when it had not

The investigation also made safety recommendations, including:

- Emphasizing the use of standard phrases in radio communications
- Avoiding the phrase "take-off" in ATC departure clearances

Other factors that contributed to the crash included: Low visibility due to layers of low-lying clouds, Stress, Small group communication under stress, and small group dynamics.


