PRESIDENT'S REPORT



Captain Robin Tatman, Chapter 1268 President

Hi everyone!

It is so lovely to have cooler fall temperatures, finally, rolling in to Sonoma!

I was gratified to get a few items off of my To Do list this last week. We have been discussing for a while now the benefit of having the tap water checked in the club house with the possibility of installing a water treatment system. I finally made an appointment with Culligan, and Darrel, Ray, and I met with their rep last Thursday. We

discussed several different options based on the layout of the airport, the water source (well), and the water storage system. The water is not unsafe to drink, but there are reasons why sometimes it doesn't taste good or smells like sulphur. Installing a UV water sterilizer, a water softener, and a reverse osmosis system would give us safer, very clean drinking water.

By softening the water, we can take advantage of the ice maker and water dispenser in the new refrigerator, and stop buying bottled water. This will help offset the cost of system. The water is very convenient, but it has an environmental and biological cost. The softened water will also add longevity to the water heater as well. We will share our findings with the Board on Tuesday. We will keep you posted before any changes are made.

The other thing on my mind has been our banking arrangement. Our local credit union has odd fees that are difficult to work around, along with very low interest rates on savings. I called around and found a few banks, one in particular that is California based that has free checking and high yield savings accounts for business. And no fees for anything that we would use. I have passed on the information for Ray to take a look at. Even with the feds lowering the rate a quarter of a point, the increased interest rate that we would get could generate quite a bit of extra cash compared to what we get now. I think the streamlined services would save Ray some valuable time as well.

We got wonderful news last week that one of our weekly hamburger coordinators, Rony, has stepped up to fill Marilyns very big shoes overseeing the Saturday Barbecue. Thank you Rony!! That is such welcome news. The transition is taking place as we speak, and Marilyn will be able to enjoy some well-deserved time off in a few weeks. Happily for us, she will still be available to fill in once in a while and be as involved as she would like to be. I cannot overstate what a fantastic job she

has done, and how much we all appreciate her hard work.

Two other noteworthy items from the EAA: The EAA Aviation Scholarship Application window is now open, and the Volunteer of the Year Award nomination window is now open as well. More information and details for both are on the website, EAA.org.

Next Tuesday, our guest speakers will be our scholarship recipients from Air Academy. I am really looking forward to hearing about their experiences and take aways from the event.

EAA 1268 FLIGHT ADVISOR

In previous months, we briefly discussed some of the specific elements of human factors and their effect on safety. Some of the topics we discussed included crew resource management and personality types.

In the coming months, I would like to discuss more topics under the umbrella of human factors, how it contributes to safety, and most importantly, how we can mitigate the risks associated with human factors elements.

The first human factors topic we will discuss is fatigue. FAA circular 117-3 discusses fitness for duty. While advisory circular 117-3 addresses fatigue as it relates to airline trade organizations, we can apply the principles and lessons learned to our general aviation operation as well.

A quick background for FAR 117: In 2009, Colgan Air Flight 2407 got into an aggravated stall. The crew did not respond appropriately to the stall, and the aircraft crashed and killed all 49 people on board. As part of the accident investigation, one of the contributing factors was fatigue of the pilots. The FAA contended that more stringent/defined rest rules were required to ensure safe flight operations for airlines.

While we do not have duty day restrictions in general aviation, the risks associated with fatigue is a very real consideration, and a risk factor we need to consider every time we fly. We need to ask ourselves every flight if we are

fit to fly. Fatigue is just one of the aspects of our fitness, but one of the more insidious factors because as pilots, we tend to marginalize or skew our admission of fatigue because we think it makes us seem weak. Pilots tend to be goal-oriented, and want to complete the mission (flight). However, there is no shame in recognizing and disclosing that we are fatigued. We should never fly if we are significantly fatigued or not fit to fly for any reason. There is a classic saying that the hardest airplane maneuver is the 180-degree turn. (turning around, and not pushing the weather). However, an equally hard admission is to say "I am fatigued, and not fit to fly." That training flight/cross country trip will always be there the next day.

Fatigue is generally broken down into four types: Transient, Cumulative, and Circadian.

Transient fatigue is acute fatigue from severe sleep deprivation or extended wake within a day or two.

Cumulative Fatigue builds up over several days or weeks due to insufficient recovery sleep.

Circadian fatigue comes from the body's internal biological clock (circadian rhythm) which relates to sleep-wake cycles.

Mitigation of the first two factors is fairly straight forward. We need to prepare for each flight by ensuring we get adequate rest. Rest requirements are different for everyone. Listen to your body, and figure out how much sleep you need to perform at the highest mental levels.

Circadian fatigue is a little more insidious. We could do an entire discussion on Windows of Circadian Lows (WOCLs)...and we may do that in coming months! The short description of WOCL is the time of the daily corresponding to the minimum core body temperature. It is the time of day when people feel most sleepy and are least able to perform.

The circadian body clock produces two times of peak sleepiness in 24 hours: For most people on a normal routine, this occurs in the early morning between 3 and 5 AM, and in the early afternoon around 3 to 5 PM.

While flying in the 3 to 5 AM period is generally commercial pilots operating on the "backside of the clock," the 3 to 5 PM circadian low can be a factor for us on a regular basis. An awareness of our WOCL allows us to avoid flights during those times, or at least recognize our body's limitation and increase our vigilance.

Fatigue can be a real aviation threat. Adjust your schedule/commitments to ensure adequate rest in preparation for your next flight. Do not fly if you are significantly fatigued or not fit to fly for any reason.



GET THE MOST BANG FOR YOUR DONATION BUCK!

Do you have an IRA account (Traditional, Rollover, and SEP all qualify)? Are you 70 1/2 years old (or more)? If you meet both of those conditions, there is an IRS approved program to capture 100% of Qualified Charitable Donations. The end of the year is coming, which means it's time to review your

deductions and maybe avoid paying some taxes.

For most folks, if you are nice enough to donate to qualified charities (aka 501(c)(3)) like our EAA Chapter, about 30% of the amount donated reduces your tax bill. So, if you donated \$100 to a charity, then your tax bill would be reduced by about \$30. Taking advantage of QCDs can allow you to take the full \$100 off of your tax bill.

In order to qualify, you must: Have an IRA (Individual Retirement Account) and be at least 70 1/2 years old. (OK, I'm repeating myself.)

Under this program, you can contribute a bunch of dough (up to \$108,000 per year!) directly from your IRA to one or more charities. This allows you to lower your taxable income which reduces overall tax liability, reduces your AGI (Adjusted Gross Income), and can count towards fulfilling RMD (Required Minimum Distribution) obligations if you have them. It can also lower Medicare premiums by reducing IRMAA obligations which is based on AGI. Even better, you can still take advantage of the program if you don't itemize and take the standard deduction.

Ok, now what? First of all, if you have a financial planner, tell them you are interested in making a QCD. If you don't have one, call your brokerage house where your IRA resides and tell them that you are interested in making a QCD. I called Charles Schwab, Fidelity, and Etrade just to see what they had to say about it. They all said you have to fill out a form which will generate a check that goes to your chosen charity. Charles Schwab allows you to generate three donations on one form. Sometimes you can do it online yourself, and sometimes they will do it for you, all for different reasons. The reps at all three companies were helpful and can guide you through the process.

Anything else? Yes, four important things to note:

- 1. Don't wait until the last minute (like December 31 at 4pm) to initiate the process. Most brokerage houses have deadlines around the first or second week of December. It can take up to two weeks to get the check cut, verify the charity, and get it mailed out. It must be received by the IRS by December 31.
- 2. Two of the representatives I talked to suggested that you have the check (which will be made out to the charity) mailed to your home address for you to deliver to your charity. This way you can make a copy of it to save for documentation.
- 3. Once the charity has received the donation, have them send you a receipt, again for documentation. (Ray will be happy to do this!) The IRS may ask for it if you ever get audited. This will make your CPA less cranky.
- 4. Have the correct name and address of your charity available when you start the process. You don't usually need their EIN.

If we are lucky enough to consider your interest in donating to us, here is our info. We are a qualified 501(c)(3).
